
All students should be seated in forum at that time.

In ELA the students have been working hard! A big part of class time has been dedicated to reading Brian's Winter, the classic alternate ending book to Hatchet, which the kids read in school previously. Along with reading the story, the kids have been completing Reader's Notes to help with their understanding of the book and improve their writing skills. Coupled with that has been the students completing Free Writes every other day, which allows the kids to write about whatever they want to help try and have the kids practice their writing, get creative, and see writing as more fun!

In math the students have been working hard on algebra. They have been writing both expressions and equations, and evaluating them. We will continue this and start working on ratios, rates, and percentages.





Students have enjoyed learning about phases of matter in science. We focused on the three primary states, solids, liquids and gases, and how heat energy affects the molecules in each phase. The material covered will help students understand the concepts to be covered in our next unit - the water cycle! Students will develop an understanding of how water moves through the environment in a continuous process. Both of these units will build a strong foundation for our upcoming weather unit.

STATE TEST INFO

Q: What are the New York State (NYS) tests for grades 3-8?

A: The NYS tests are annual assessments that measure student learning in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics for grades 3-8. Additionally, students in grades 5 and 8 take a Science assessment to evaluate their understanding of key scientific concepts and skills.

<u>Q: Why are these tests important?</u>

A: The tests provide valuable data on student learning and progress. They help educators refine curriculum, adjust instruction, and provide targeted support where needed. The results also help identify student strengths and areas that may need improvement.

Q: Are teachers evaluated based on student test scores?

A: No, teachers are not evaluated based on student performance on state tests. These assessments are used to improve teaching and learning by helping schools understand student needs and adjust instruction accordingly.

<u>Q: How can parents help their child prepare for these tests?</u>

A: Parents can support their child by encouraging good study habits, fostering a positive attitude toward learning, and ensuring they get enough rest and a nutritious breakfast on test days. Engaging in regular reading, practicing problem-solving skills, and maintaining open communication with teachers can also reinforce classroom learning.

Q: Should students feel stressed about these tests?

A: No. While students should do their best, these tests are just one measure of progress. Parents and educators should remind students that their effort is what matters most and help them approach the tests with confidence rather than anxiety.

Q: How do schools use the test results?

A: Schools use test results to identify trends in student learning, refine curriculum, and implement strategies to support students.

CELL PHONES

Policy as written in the MCSD Code of Conduct:

DRESS CODE

Policy as written in the MCSD Code of Conduct:

A student's dress shall:

- Not include open-back shirts/blouses, tube tops, sports bras, or tops with large cutouts on the side
- Shirts must be long enough to cover the majority of the abdomen and provide adequate coverage at the neckline
- Not include costume apparel with the exception of special events
- Not include chains, choke collars, collars with spikes, and other related items that may be considered dangerous

Smartwatches

- Smartwatches may be worn but must have notifications and alerts silenced during instructional time.
- The use of smartwatches for communication (calls, texts, emails) during instructional time is prohibited unless approved by the teacher for educational purposes
